

FOREWORD

his year we mark the 11th edition of the *Laadli* Media and Advertising Awards for Gender Sensitivity. We have grown, not just in the domains that we cover but even the categories within those. It has been an exhilarating, challenging, and at times tiring journey. Yet, when one sits back and contemplates, leafing through the work that has been felicitated over the years, there is a deep sense of satisfaction, albeit momentarily as there is so much more to be done, so many more heights to be scaled.

The articles, print, electronics, and digital reports, films, advertisements, books and documentaries, that have been selected in this edition of the awards, look at topics as diverse as the frontline workers and the difficulties they have faced during the pandemic, the patriarchal mindsets that still keep seemingly obsolete practices such as "Ghunghat", manual scavenging or child marriages intact, the frank conversations on sexuality, a deeper exploration of the LGBTQ+ community and much more. Not just the topics, but even the formats have become more varied and bolder. This year we have instituted a new category of special award The *Laadli* Gender Champion Award, to honor the triumvirate of India's feminist movement and whose voices continue to reverberate globally- Gail Omvedt, Kamla Bhasin and Sonal Shukla. It was presented to Flavia Agnes, the noted women right's lawyer for her commendable work. Our other special awards recognize some path breaking and monumental work whether it is Shama Zaidi who was presented the *Laadli* of the Century Award for her contribution to the film and theatre world, or Padam Shri Dr. Neelam Mansingh Chowdhry, for her dramatic compositions that blend traditional folk arts with modern works, or Tanuja Chandra, for creating a niche for herself as a script writer and director.

The strides that we have assiduously been making over the last decade or so would not have been possible without the support of our partners, funders and well-wishers. I wish to thank UNFPA and The Royal Norwegian Embassy in India for reposing their faith in us and supporting us in all our endeavours.

A team that stands together unified in their passion to see a gender-equitable future is a must for the body of work being undertaken. I am grateful for my dynamic team who pushes not just their boundaries, but collectively is constantly setting new benchmarks. 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REGIONAL AWARDS

he regional edition of this year's *Laadli* Media & Advertising Awards for Gender Sensitivity (LMAAGS) once again recognized stellar contributions in the media space across the four regions of the nation. Noted independent journalist, Faye D'Souza was the Chief Guest while Sriram Haridass, Country Representative, UNFPA India was the Guest of Honor. The Jury comprised leading personalities from journalism, education, activism, films, television and advertising. Following a successful collaboration over the past several years, the initiative is once again supported by UNFPA and the Norwegian Embassy in India.

Despite a severe second COVID-19 wave, an encouraging number of 833 applications were sifted through to reward winners. A total of 71 winners and 27 Jury Appreciation Citations have been awarded. Entries were sought this year too from print electronic and web media covering 23 categories.



To honour the work of the late Gail Omvedt, Kamla Bhasin, and Sonal Shukla, stalwarts of the Indian feminist movement and social activists, who passed away recently, the *Laadli* Gender Champion Award was instituted and it was given to Flavia Agnes, the well-known women's rights lawyer.

To mark the occasion, a colourful mélange of performances by Ekjute Theatre Group and Aarabhi- The Center For Performing Arts with its ensemble of young violinists has been put together.



BOOK | ENGLISH | AUTOBIOGRAPHY QUEERISTAN


PARMESH SHAHANI | AMAZON

KAVITA KRISHNAN | PENGUIN RANDOM HOUSE, INDIA



Fearless Freedom looks at a range of issues as it juxtaposes the commonly held norms of safety with what true personal freedom means for a woman. In India, safekeeping for women is often equated with their autonomy being curtailed as they are placed under constant surveillance of a watchful eye. The book challenges the patriarchal standards that clutch society and highlights the personal and political repercussions of erasing women from public spaces and keeping them confined to what is traditionally deemed a safe space.

BOOK | HINDI | FICTION BISAAT PAR JUGNU VANDANA RAG | RAJKAMAL PRAKASHAN

Published by Rajkamal Prakashan, Bisaat Per Jugnu, portrays the stories of women from two distinct countries with a similar background of coming out of war and fighting the tyranny of the colonist powers, India in the backdrop of 1857 and China in the aftermath of the two Opium Wars. The story captures the travails of common women from Patna to Delhi and the Canton region of China, and who have chosen to jump into the conflict. They dot the narrative like fireflies in the darkness, providing a tiny but nonetheless, a shiny ray of hope.





BOOK |HINDI | NON- FICTION AURAT KA SAFAR - JAIL SE JAIL TAK SEEMA AZAD | AGORA PRAKASHAN

Seema Azad's book " Aurat Ka Safar - Jail se Jail Tak" looks at the lives of 27 incarcerated women who have been victims of barbaric patriarchy and casteism. She noted their stories during her own term in the Naini Central Jail. She looks at their living conditions, the status of justice being accorded to them, and their personal circumstances that led to their present state. A human rights activist, she studied their social background and looks at what lies ahead for them, as they step from a smaller jail to what could be a larger jail for these women.

THEATRE JI JAISI AAPKI MARZI NADIRA BABBAR

Nadira Babbar, through her over three-decade-long career in theatre has produced some remarkable work that highlights the social issues facing society. Through her theatre group, Ekjute, she has experimented with style, themes, and techniques liberally to create powerful works that have left a lasting impression. Ji Jaisi Aapki Marzi, written by Nadira Babbar looks at the lives of four different female protagonists and examines various roles assigned to women in our societies as well as the overt and covert bias that exists against them. The blood-curdling violence that gets socially sanctioned leaves the viewers shocked and disturbed for long.


The film raises the issues of domestic violence and its psychological impact on the woman. It also lays bare the societal patriarchal mindset where it is "Ok" for the husband to abuse the wife but the onus of making the marriage work still rests on the woman. Whether it is her sacrificing her dreams at the altar of her husband's ambitions or kowtowing to the parental and societal demands, the woman has to be the one to mend, maintain and make the relationships work.

Through Amrita's journey, the film explores the common practice of relegating a woman to secondary status while the man is naturally given the privilege to forge ahead with his dreams expecting the woman to support him unflinchingly. It also looks at the family narratives that run around divorce and women's freedom through essaying the story of two older women, the mother, and the mother-in-law.

OTT RELEASE - AMAZON PRIME THE GREAT INDIAN KITCHEN JEO BABY

The Great Indian Kitchen traces the story of a Malayalee girl raised in Bahrain and a trained dancer. She gets married into a traditional and orthodox family in Kerela. The narrative takes the viewer through her married life as she grapples with the patriarchal and regressive mindset of her in-laws and husband. She eventually moves out of this conjugation to craft a life as a successful dancer. The film exposes the everyday lived-in reality of women, stuck in the rut of everyday drudgery and care work with no recognition, no choice, and no freedom.





DOCUMENTARY W.O.M.B-WOMEN OF MY BILLION SRISHTI BAKSHI

W.O.M.B- Women Of My Billion, captures the 3800-kilometer-long arduous journey of Srishti Bakshi as she walked from Kanyakumari to Kashmir in an effort to raise awareness about all forms of violence against women. The 90-minute film is a compelling documentation of stories from across the country of women who are subjected to violence regularly. These real-life stories cutting across all strata of society, range from domestic abuse, acid attacks, sexual violence to child sexual abuse and are interspersed with several workshops and awareness programs that Srishti undertook as a way to bring up the issue in the collective mind space.

The film truly challenges the gendered norms about girls being helpless. Stuck in the middle of a road with a flat tyre, the young female protagonist steps up to change the wheel and deftly takes the spare tyre out and fixes it, much to her mother's surprise. The neat and brisk narrative, shows the stressed mother coming out of her discomposure, and acknowledging her young daughter's prowess.

Released on the Global Handwash Day 2020, the film features Swapna Augustine, a foot artist from the Mouth and Foot Painters (MFPA) Association. The film eventually shows her washing her feet diligently before eating her food. LAADLI WOMAN BEHIND THE SCREEN TANUJA CHANDRA



Women are visible on the screen and their contribution to the film industry is well recognized. Unfortunately, their participation and visibility in other fields of filmmaking, production, direction, cinematography, music direction, etc, has been feeble. Today we have many women entering the film industry in various departments and are making a name for themselves. The Laadli Woman Behind the Screen Award acknowledges such women. This year's award goes to Tanuja Chandra

Tanuja Chandra is a well-known film director and writer known for her women-centric films. She started her directorial debut with Dushman which looks at the psychological trauma of a young girl who lost her twin to a brutal murder following her rape. Her next film Sangharsh also was centered around a female protagonist who tracks down a deadly criminal. Her other films include Sur – The Melody of Life, Film Star, Zakhm, Zindaggi Rocks, Qarib Qarib Single and Hope and a Little Sugar, Silvat, a short film and a documentary Aunty Sudha Aunty Radha, that talks about sisterhood in a rural setting. She has directed television serials like Zameen Aasman and Mumkin. She co-wrote the screenplay of Yash Chopra's hugely successful film Dil Toh Pagal hai and Mahesh Bhatt's Tamnna.

Multi-faceted, she has extended her footprint into journalism as she contributes articles and columns to several leading publications such the Indian Express. She has recently authored a book that is replete with quirky, strange, funny and intriguing tales from small-towns in Uttar Pradesh.

LAADLI GENDER CHAMPION AWARD

This year, three stalwarts of the Indian feminist movement Gail Omvedt, Kamala Bhasin and Sonal Shukla passed away. They had made an impact not just in India but globally. *Laadli* has instituted The *Laadli* Gender Champion Award as a tribute to the triumvirate of India's feminist movement.

Gail Omvedt

2nd August 1941-25th August 2021

Gail Omvedt was a globally acclaimed and respected sociologist and human rights activist. She firmly believed that the feminist movement is for the abolition of gender exploitation of all kinds and abolition of gender as a socio-economic, cultural reality which is the basis of the exploitation. She had dedicated her life to Dalit and anti-caste movements, environmental, farmers' and rural women's movements. She had co-founded Shramik Mukti Dal, and was also actively involved with Stri Mukti Sangarsh Chalval which works on issues of abandoned women in Sangli and Satara districts of southern Maharashtra, and the Shetkari Mahila Aghadi, which works for women's land rights and



political power. She was a firm supporter of allyship and chose to bring forth leaders from the communities she worked with and portray their work freely.

Kamla Bhasin

24th April, 1946 - 25th September, 2021

"Feminism, for me, has never been anti-men. It has been anti-patriarchy." Kamla Bhasin was an Indian developmental feminist, poet, author and social scientist whose work focused mainly on gender, education, human development, bridge-building between communities and countries, and the media. She co-founded Sangat, a Feminist Network, currently a part of Jagori. She was also the South Asia coordinator of One Billion Rising. Kamla ji's was a strong believer in the power of community mobilization and the importance of sloganeering, street plays, posters and other forms of visual media to connect with and usher in any significant change. Azadi, the poem penned by her, reverberates at any movement for



change. Her books and booklets on patriarchy and gender have been translated into nearly 30 languages are now used as teaching aids.

Sonal Shukla

1941-9th September, 2021

Sonal Shukla was an educator, a Gandhian, and a feminist who has contributed immensely to the Indian feminist movement through her writing, workshops, songs, street plays, and more. She firmly believed that education was the only way to stem gender-based violence and urged women to claim their unique identity, question norms, and carve a path of their own. She founded Vacha in 1987, initially a library replete with feminist readings and books, and a meeting place for women scholars, it evolved to be a charitable trust pushing for the cause of girls' education.



On March 8, 2021, Friedrich Ebert Stiftung (FES), India, awarded Sonal Ben Gender Icon Award and noted that she was 'An icon of the Women's movement in India and across.

LAADLI GENDER CHAMPION AWARD FLAVIA AGNES



Flavia Agnes is an Indian women's rights lawyer with expertise in marital, divorce and property law who champions the cause of women seeking legal recourse. She has helped more than 50,000 women by providing them legal representation on issues of matrimonial rights, child custody and counselling through MAJLIS, a legal and cultural resource center that campaigns for the legal rights of women.

A practicing lawyer in Mumbai High Court, she also advises various government agencies and has influenced the policies, programmes and legislation as an activist, a writer and an opinion leader. A prolific writer and author, her articles have appeared in leading journals. She has authored many books on women's rights.

LAADLI LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD PADMA SHRI DR NEELAM MANSINGH CHOWDHRY



Padma Shri Dr. Neelam Mansingh Chowdhry is a globally acclaimed theatre personality and is a Professor Emeritus at Punjab University. She was bestowed with the Sangeet Natak Akademi Award in Theatre Direction in 2003. Her well-known plays include Kitchen Katha, The Suit, Yerma, Nagamandala, The Mad Woman of Chaillot, Little Eyolf, Bitter Fruit, Naked Voices, Stree Patra and Gumm Hai.

Through a journey of nearly 30 years, Neelam ji has experimented with formats, structure, space, narration as well as characters, freely, to interpret each production differently. A student of Ebrahim Alkazi at the National School of Drama, Neelam ji has worked with famous theatre personalities like BV Karanth, Naseeruddin Shah, and Om Puri before she moved to Chandigarh. She started experimenting with her roots in Punjab as she explored various forms of Punjabi folk art such as gatka, the martial arts of the Nihangs, or Dadhis or Sufi balladeers. She has used the natural setting of the famous Rock Gardens to host her plays.

"Vision is not static and it constantly evolves" and "The more you see, the bigger is the world of the self you enter" is what she believes in and it reflects in the way she deconstructs and interprets each of her oeuvres.

Shama ji has been a trailblazer and has set an example for the younger generation of filmmakers through her vast body of work with stalwarts such as Satyajit Ray, Shyam Benegal, and M.S. Sathyu, a rare accomplishment indeed. She has developed screenplay, designed costumes, or been an art director for highly acclaimed films like Garam Hawa, Charandas Chor, Zubeida, Mandi, Hari Bhari, Mammo, Nishant, Manthan, Shatranj Ke Khiladi, and many more.

Shamaji's journey with theatre started with Hindustani Theatre as a costume designer and artist with some noteworthy productions like Shakuntala, Mitti ki Gaadi, Khalid Ki Khala, Mudrarakshas, Sufaid Kundali, Mera Naam Trufaldeen.

Each of her projects will be remembered for showcasing the social reality of the times, and speaks of her undeniable contribution as well as underpins her talent for detail-oriented research.


